School culture is a many-faceted phenomenon, but experts agree that it is essential for a successful school. We work hard to live our Eight Keys as a staff and be mindful of each interaction we have with our students, parents, and each other to understand, seek understanding, and collaborate effectively. We also keep our vision statement and values before us to guide our decisions throughout each day.

Security. Character. Connections. Growth. Excellence.

This time of year, we can become tired, complacent, or restless. I notice the tendency in myself, in other adults, and also our adolescents. During this morning's announcements, I discussed this tendency with our whole school. It's easier to "let our guard down" when we feel this way, contributing to a slide away from what we each know are best-practices. How I discuss these things with students is that we are all in this together. Let's hold ourselves accountable for being the best versions of ourselves!

Here are some things we can collectively pay attention to in order to align our values with practice. These could potentially be discussion starters surrounding our value words listed above.

- Arriving at school with the plan of heading directly to first-period class: This is a safety expectation during times of COVID and can be challenging for adolescents to understand. We value their social time, and we also need to limit hallway hang-outs. Changing drop-off time to closer to the start of class may help some students with this expectation.
- Enjoying lunchtime with the smaller group of students that can fit around our tables at this time: We value students' time to enjoy eating and talking with friends, and we also need to limit larger and closer groups at lunchtime. Students remain seated until they are signaled for the option of going outside for fresh air and a bit of exercise.
- Aligning ourselves with an accepted tenet of our Charter School: We value our adolescent students' need for more autonomy with the uniform policy. For this reason, polo colors and shoe colors are not restricted for middle school students, and our high school students enjoy a dress code as opposed to a uniform policy. We have noticed potential conflict and culture issues around hoodies/non-uniform outerwear and boots. Students may choose MA jackets, sweater vests, or cardigans when it comes to outerwear inside our building. Non-uniform outerwear is expected to remain in lockers unless students go outside for PE, lunch, or are headed to carline. Boots are not included in the options of shoes for middle school students to wear to school.

These may seem like small things, but as we may have experienced in workplace culture or home culture, the small things can quickly become big things if not discussed.

Culture is multifaceted. These rules and procedures are only one small part, and we simultaneously pay attention to so many other vital aspects of culture.

2021 CMAS Colorado State Standardized Assessments

The Colorado Department of Education (CDE) is currently planning to have schools administer CMAS assessments this spring in the subject areas of math and reading. CMAS social studies will not be administered this year, and it is not yet known if science will be administered. It is possible that no CMAS assessments will be administered this spring, but if they are, there will not be an option for remote assessments. This means that any students completing the CMAS assessments will need to do so in-person and at school.

We expect that some families may choose to refuse allowing their students to complete CMAS assessments this year due to concerns about COVID-19. CDE has asked us to include an option for specifying COVID-19 as a reason for refusal to our normal refusal process.
